ACADEMIC REGALIA

This is the season for honoring all graduates; from Kindergarten through Careers and Higher Education. It is important, and we should remind ourselves, that the graduation ceremony is observed as a very special event and we should celebrate such accomplishments with the respect that is warranted. To increase our knowledge and peak more interest from our youth, please review the following information. Attire worn for graduations is called academic regalia and may include cap, gown, tassel and/or hood. Each part has a special significance.

Academic regalia in the United States has a history going back to the colonial colleges era. It has been most influenced by the academic dress traditions of Europe.

The most common headpiece or cap for the ceremony is the black square, flat-topped, or "mortar board" type with gold or black tassel. It is called a "mortar board" because it is shaped like the board of the mason which holds mortar. There are also velvet Tam-O-Shanter style headpieces replacing the mortar board.

The tassel on the **doctor's cap** is usually gold, and permanently fastened on the left side. The **master's cap** has a black tassel worn on the left. The **bachelor's cap** has a black tassel worn on the right prior to graduation then moved to the left during the ceremony

The hood can be the most colorful part of the entire attire. The colors inside the hood are those of the college or university which is awarding the degree. The colors of the outside rim of the hood symbolize one of the departments of learning.

The university gown is usually black, although some schools use gowns in the school's colors. Gowns recommended for use in the colleges and universities of this country have the following characteristics. The **gown for the bachelor's degree** has pointed sleeves. It is designed to be worn closed. The **gown for the master's degree** has an oblong sleeve, open at the wrist, like the others. The sleeve base hangs down in the traditional manner. The rear part of its oblong shape is square cut, and the front part has an arc cut away. The gown is so designed and supplied with fasteners that it may be worn open or closed. The **gown for the doctor's degree** has bell-shaped sleeves. It is so designed and supplied with fasteners that it may be worn open or closed.

Gowns for the bachelor's or master's degrees are untrimmed. For the doctor's degree, the gown is faced down the front with black velvet; three bars of velvet are used across the sleeves. These facings and crossbars may be of velvet of the color distinctive of the disciplines to which the degree pertains, thus agreeing in color with the binding or edging of the hood appropriate to the particular doctor's degree in every instance. For all academic purposes, including trimmings of doctors' gowns, edging of hoods, and tassels of caps, the colors are associated with the different disciplines.
